BOARD REPORT

It is with pleasure that we present the Annual Report and Financial Accounts of Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club for the year ending 30th April 2017. This year has seen another record profit of \$1,610,253, further strengthening the clubs financial position; with a closing cash reserve of \$4,488,972.

The financial results were very pleasing considering we achieved another record year while increasing our spend on sailing by 4.5%. There are many people who contributed to these outstanding results, specifically the Board would like to acknowledge and thank our Secretary Manager Matt Hazell, and the entire team, working at both the Manly and St George venues, for their dedication and commitment throughout the year.

At Manly, we saw our trading result increase by 6.9% with the club continuing to focus on managing the venue and delivering market leading products and services to our members and their guests. Unfortunately this year we said good bye to our head chef Brooks but the board are very happy to announce a very talented replacement in Shane Davey, and we look forward to him stamping his mark on the club.

At St George, John Tsambouniaris and his team continue to do an amazing job while facing significant hurdles working with the constraints a venue in need of renovation presents. We are very lucky to have such a dedicated and committed team looking after our members down south. This dedication continues to deliver positive effects on the profitability of our club.

Since the end of the financial year we have had further challenges with this venue with a significant portion of the club being cordoned off due to structural issues. This will mean FY18 budgets at this venue will be very challenging to achieve. In regard to the re development of the site, due to the impact the structural issues are having on the venue, it is the Boards intention to finalise a sustainable design and business plan and commence lodging the appropriate applications before Christmas 2017.

Detailed results of all the club's sailing classes in the recent season are contained in the appropriate areas of the Annual Report so we won't repeat them. We would however like to congratulate all the club's sailors, volunteers, sponsors and supporters for a fantastic season. The club achieved many successes across both Manly and St George fleets, numbers participating have grown on the previous year, and we are confident of continuing these results into the future.

In closing, it is with great sadness that at the time of writing that I report on the recent passing of one of our Life Members, Hugh Cooke. Over many decades Hugh directed the club sailing division with distinction as Commodore, race committee member, on water rescue official, junior sailing division coach right through to assisting at the club BBQ on social days. His service, commitment and passion to the club was outstanding and he will be sorely missed by all.

Finally, the Board would like to sincerely thank all members for your continued patronage of the club. The board, management and staff are looking forward to another year of providing you with the best possible experience at Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club.

On the Manly club scene the senior 16ft skiff fleet had 28 skiffs registered, while the 13ft fleet had 14 registered which provided close weekly competition throughout the season. Our junior and intermediate fleets continue to grow with as many as 40 junior families joining us each Sunday for some competitive although friendly racing. The junior's successes at State and Club levels are fully described in the junior Chairman's report within - my congratulations go to competitors.

Congratulations to all our class club champions and point score winners from both clubs. For those that are not aware, between our two clubs we race 8 different classes with a combined total of over 135 boats with an addition of another 10 or so for next season. We do have a large family!

The 16ft Skiff Nationals were held this season on the NSW South Coast at Lake Illawarra, hosted by the Illawarra Y.C. One could say that it may well go down in history as one of the lightest winds regatta ever held. 6 heats out of the 7 saw skiffs sailing in breezes averaging around 8-12 knots which made conditions quite trying for the heavier crews. History was also made with 7 different heat winners with our own Firestopping finishing runner up by one point to TJS Services from the Belmont club.

The NSW 16ft Skiff State Championship trophy returned to us for the ninth year running with Fire Stopping winning 2 heats to take out the series from our own Sutech Building Consultants.

The 13ft skiff class once again sailed a series in conjunction with the 16ft Skiff Nationals at Lake Illawarra and this year was won by Queensland for the first time. The series was won by Mightymite from Darling Point Squadron with our 13ft skiff Dimension Polyant runner up skippered Jordan Ferguson and crewed by Harry West. The 13ft skiff class is certainly building with another 5 new boats being built at the time of writing for Manly crews while our sister club St George has introduced the class with 4 boats and Illawarra starting up with a fleet with 6.

Manly will see an increase next year with another 4 skiffs joining us as new sailors from both our 13ft skiff fleet along with new members while we will also see the introduction of 7 new skiffs from South East Asia make their new home to existing skiff sailors.

This season saw the welcoming back after 7 years of Brad Andrew as our Sailing Operations Manager for both our clubs. Not only has Brad been working behind the scenes with Manly's sailing management, he has worked extensively in the administration and sailing management of our St George club and I thank Brad for all his work and assistance this year.

In the meantime, they have been trading well and Manager John Tsambouniaris and his team deserve a huge pat on the back for another great year in difficult circumstances.

Finally, I'd like to thank the Board of Directors for their support and the management and staff at both Manly and St George for their hard work and commitment throughout the year. It has been a pleasure working with you all this year and with the St George project on the horizon, I look forward to another challenging and exciting year ahead.

Congratulations also goes to our respective class National & State Champions.

The weekly club scene at both clubs continues to grow from strength to strength with approximately 130 boats from both clubs hitting the water each weekend. This certainly shows the dedication of all our sailors and families back to the club who strongly supports them all—thank you!

Your Board of Directors continue to support sailing in an exceptionally generous way and their support shows in the caliber of all our fleets. The Australian 16ft skiff association new boat program continues to build the Manly fleet and this has now extended into the 13ft skiff fleet. The positive outcome of this including the Boards support has seen 7 new 16ft skiffs for Manly next season and 1 new skiff for St George while some of the second-hand skiffs have moved down to St George to increase their fleet next season by 4-5 boats. The 13ft skiff class will also see 5 new boats at Manly which now has enabled the introduction of the 13ft skiff class to St George with an initial 4 boats starting next season on Botany Bay while others have been purchased by Illawarra Yacht Club youth sailors building a new fleet on the south coast region.

Next season will see the club hosting two National Championships with the MG14 Class being hosted at St George on Botany Bay while later in January 2018 Manly will host the Flying 11 Class with expectations of close to 90 boats competing. I look forward to continuing to work closely with these classes to ensure that both championships are a success.

To ensure a continual flow of sailors through both clubs and our sailing pathway the Board recently committed additional funding to the Junior Division of both clubs to assist with junior growth. Part of this funding has been directed towards the formal appointment of club coaches to work closely with both Manly and St George junior sailors. This position was advertised towards the end of the season and after interviewing numerous candidates with extremely high credentials I am pleased to announce the appointment of Niall Powers and Andrew 'Dolly' Divola to the role of coaching providers for the group. I welcome both these guys on board and trust that they will enjoy this role with the club.

Sailing at Manly and St George is not only all about the competitive side of the sport but also involves a great deal of comradeship and after race socializing. This helps create a close sailing 'family' and this is something I think both clubs can be extremely proud of achieving over many years. Regular after race sailors and families get togethers' has provided a catalyst for this and I look forward to seeing these events continue to be supported by all throughout the season.

In closing, the sailing operations of both clubs each weekend happens only by the dedication of our volunteers. To all the volunteers from our Board of Directors, Commodore, class secretaries and organisers, our rescue boat maintenance teams plus all our on-water officials who turn up every weekend rain, hail or shine - thank you for your support, you make my role enjoyable.

The financial reports cover Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club Limited as an individual entity. Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club Limited is a for not-for-profit company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The functional and presentation currency of Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club Limited is Australian dollars. The financial report was authorised for issue by the Directors on 21st August, 2017. Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the Corporations Act 2001. The company is a not for profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and the costs necessary to make the sale. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Property, plant and equipment are measured using the cost model.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the assets useful life to the Company, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment, except for freehold land is depreciated on a straight line method from the date that management determine that the asset is available for use.

Leased assets and leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or their estimated useful life.

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

Leases

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all of the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight line basis over the life of the lease term.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially using trade date accounting, i.e. on the date that company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial Assets

Financial assets are divided into the following categories which are described in detail below:

- loans and receivables;
- available-for-sale financial assets: and

All income and expenses relating to financial assets are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income in the 'finance income' or 'finance costs' line item respectively.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise principally through the provision of goods and services to customers but also incorporate other types of contractual monetary assets.

After initial recognition these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Any change in their value is recognised in profit or loss.

The company's trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments. Significant receivables are considered for impairment on an individual asset basis when they are past due at the reporting date or when objective evidence is received that a specific counterparty will default. The amount of the impairment is the difference between the net carrying amount and the present value of the future expected cash flows associated with the impaired receivable. In some circumstances, the company renegotiates repayment terms with customers which may lead to changes in the timing of the payments, the company does not necessarily consider the balance to be impaired, however assessment is made on a case-by-case basis.

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that do not qualify for inclusion in any of the other categories of financial assets or which have been designated in this category. The company's available-for-sale financial assets include listed securities. Available-for-sale financial assets are measured at fair value, with subsequent changes in value recognised in other comprehensive income. Gains and losses arising from financial instruments classified as available-for-sale are only recognised in profit or loss when they are sold or when the investment is impaired. In the case of impairment or sale, any gain or loss previously recognised in equity is transferred to the profit or loss.

Financial liabilities

The company's financial liabilities include borrowings, trade and other payables (including finance lease liabilities), which are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Impairment of financial assets

At the end of each reporting period, the company assesses whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset has been impaired.

Financial assets at amortised cost

If there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on financial assets carried at amortised cost has been incurred, the amount of the loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial assets original effective interest rate. Impairment on loans and receivables is reduced through the use of an allowance accounts, all other impairment losses on financial assets at amortised cost are taken directly to the asset.

Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against other expenses in profit or loss.

Available-for-sale financial assets

A significant or prolonged decline in value of an available-for-sale asset below its cost is objective evidence of impairment, in this case, the cumulative loss that has been recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified from equity to profit or loss as a reclassification adjustment. Any subsequent increase in the value of the asset is taken directly to other comprehensive income.

Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

At the end of each reporting period the company determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets. Where this indicator exists the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit. Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss, except for goodwill.

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Intangibles Goodwill

Goodwill is carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses.

Goodwill - testing for impairment

Goodwill is tested annually for impairment and carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses. Gains and losses on the disposal of an entity include the carrying amount of goodwill related to the entity sold.

Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Employee benefits are presented as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the company does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date regardless of the classification of the liability for measurement purposes under AASB 119.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the company has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the outflow required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting year.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the company and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST). Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Interest revenue

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depends on whether the outcome of the services can be measured reliably. If this is the case then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period. If the outcome cannot be reliably measured then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the company is entitled to it.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position. Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority are classified as operating cash flows.

Comparative Amounts

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated. Where a change in comparatives has also affected the opening retained earnings previously presented in a comparative period, an opening statement of financial position at the earliest date of the comparative period has been presented.

New Accounting Standards for Application in Future Periods

The AASB has issued a number of new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods, some of which are relevant to the company. The company has decided to adopt the new standards when they become mandatory with the exception of the reduced disclosure framework.
