BOARD REPORT

It is with pleasure that we present the Annual Report and Financial Accounts of Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club for the year ending 30th April 2022. While it is almost a year ago since the last Greater Sydney lockdown, the FY2022 trading year for the second-year running was curtailed by covid related issues, including three months of lockdown and various capacity restrictions. Pleasingly however we can report a profit of \$805,819, which in most part has been delivered with the unwavering commitment by the staff of the club.

The club has a closing cash reserve of \$2,434,224 resulting in an annual decrease of \$3,913,637. It does however need to be noted this includes payments to Join Construction and contractors to the sum of \$7,128,187 for the redevelopment of the St George site. Additionally we should also report the club has drawn down the first portion of its \$6 million construction facility to the amount of \$1,725,459

There are many people who contributed to these results, specifically the Board would like to acknowledge and thank our Secretary Manager Matt Hazell, and the entire team for their dedication and commitment throughout the year.

As a board our major goal has been to complete the St George redevelopment and at the time of writing this report the opening is imminent. We have faced many challenges navigating the disruption to the development due to the supply and construction industry issues during the pandemic. Although we have unfortunately seen many delays, we are happy to report the construction contract has been managed with no significant variations.

These new facilities will allow the club to continue its ongoing support for the sport of sailing. Further, it is our great hope that the club can recapture its long history as a community hub, being the destination of choice for the local community and sailors alike.

Detailed results of all the club's sailing classes in the recent season are contained in the appropriate areas of the Annual Report so as usual we won't repeat them here. The Board would however like to congratulate all the club's sailors, volunteers, sponsors, and supporters for a fantastic season.

On an exciting note, we have begun our planning for the club's 100th celebration. We can now confirm the National Titles will be held at Manly Jan 2023, followed by our 100th birthday event in Feb 2023. We sincerely hope the COVID 19 pandemic has been resolved by the time we reach these milestones, with celebrations likely to be greatly anticipated and attended.

Finally, the Board would like to sincerely thank all members for your continued patronage of the club when possible. The board, management and staff are looking ahead with cautious optimism and hope to see you soon in person.

To the St George sailors, officials, volunteers, supporters, and sailing administrator Jack Andrew, thank you all for being so patient over the time your home base wasn't available.

At the time of writing, we genuinely haven't been able to lock in the opening date due to all the variables the building process, the pandemic, and the weather have contributed constantly to timing. We are however very close and expect to be trading before too long. On behalf of the Board, we thank you all for your support through the exciting project and sincerely hope you all enjoy the new facility when it opens.

SECRETARY MANAGERS REPORT

The 2021/22 financial year was another difficult one for the Club.

For the second year in a row Covid saw us lockdown and close, this time for three and a half months from the 26th of June. We finally returned on the 11th of October and thankfully picked up almost instantly from where we left off. Our open-air settings on the deck, in the atrium and on the terrace, saw our members and quests eager to return.

Unfortunately, it wasn't long until the second La Nina event in a row started to put a literal dampener on our proceedings for the rest of spring, summer and autumn. The usual Melbourne Cup Marquis went up on the deck in November but ended up staying there until June and whilst this guaranteed us some more bookable seats, it wasn't quite the same as enjoying our iconic space over the water in the sunshine under umbrellas.

December, typically our biggest month, saw some solid trade and at one point we looked like heading for record sales until Covid reared her ugly head again around the middle of the month. Whilst case numbers began to swell, this time we managed to avoid another lockdown and somehow remained open. Cancellations for our New Year's Eve event came thick and fast with bookings dropping by half in the week leading up to it. Staffing the Club also became a problem. Many nearby venues had to close due to staff shortages caused by a combination of actual Covid infections as well as forced close contact isolations. I spent Christmas day in isolation with the family as my two sons also fell victim. Thankfully our Operations Manager John Tsambouniaris (John recently opened our new Clubhouse at St George as Venue Manager) did a great job of keeping our head above water and with plenty of roster juggling and managed to keep the beer flowing. Executive Chef Justin Wong and his team including Head Chef Jonathan Dobbin also did an amazing job during this difficult and stressful time.

On the good news front and despite being closed for more than a quarter of the year, we still managed to post a reasonable profit of \$805,818.

Congratulations must go to our sailors who had another successful season, scoring several State and National titles in various classes. More about that elsewhere in this report.

Thanks again to our Board for all their support throughout the year. It has been a pleasure working with them all.

To our staff and management team, your resilience is amazing. It has been an unbelievably tough couple of years. You continue to keep smiling and always manage to deliver exceptional service to our members and guests. Thanks as always for all your help.

Finally, as I write this report, we have literally just opened the doors to the brand-new St George Sailing Club. If you haven't already seen it, check it out on the website www.stgeorgesailingclub.com.au and be sure to head on down to Sans Souci when you can.

Former Manly Ops Manager John Tsambouniaris heads up a St George team that includes Head Chef Jonathan Dobbin and Food and Beverage Manager Jimil Desai. All three have spent a significant amount of time at Manly over the last few years and I wish them all the best in their new roles. The next 12 months will be full of challenges and surprises, but I have no doubt they will rise to the task and St George will be hugely successful.

Operating Results

The profit of the company after providing for income tax amounted to \$805,819.

Significant Changes in the State of Affairs

St George Club

The company is undertaking the re-development of the St George Club premises. The St George Club ceased operations on 22 August, 2019. In line with Government health department guidelines the Manly Club ceased operations on 27 June, 2021 and resumed operations from 11 October, 2021.

Coronavirus (COVID-19)

The World Health Organisation (WHO) declared the COVID-19 virus a global health emergency on 30 January 2020. Global trade and markets have been significantly disrupted, and many businesses have had to, or will have to, limit or suspend their operations.

Principal Activities

The principal activities of the company during the financial year were as a Sailing Club.

No significant change in the nature of the company's activity occurred during the financial year.

Events After the Reporting Date

As the virus is ongoing it is also considered to be a significant event continuing to occur after the reporting period. As such, management will continue to consider the potential implications of coronavirus which included disruptions to the Club operations.

Apart from the above, including the re-development of St George, no other matters or circumstances have occurred subsequent to year end that have significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the Company, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the Company or economic entity in subsequent financial years.

DIRFCTORS' REPORT

Future Developments and Results

St George Sailing Club is due to commence operation from 1st September, 2022.

Environmental Issues

The company's operations are not regulated by any significant environmental regulations under a law of the Commonwealth or of a state or territory of Australia.

Contribution on winding up

The company is incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 and is a company limited by guarantee. If the company is wound up, the constitution states that each member is required to contribute a maximum of \$5 each towards meeting any outstanding obligations of the entity. At 30 April 2022, the total amount that members of the company are liable to contribute if the company wound up is \$56,300 (2021: \$57,140).

Indemnification and Insurance of Officers

The company has provided for and paid premiums to the value of \$15,333 (2021: \$9,763) during the year for Management Liability Insurance. The insurance is in respect of legal liability for damages and legal costs with an annual aggregate limit of \$5,000,000 arising from claims made by reason of omissions or acts (other than dishonesty) by them, whilst acting in their individual or collective capacity as directors or officers of the company, towards which the directors of the company contribute.

Auditors' Independence Declaration

The financial reports cover Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club Limited as an individual entity. Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club Limited is a for not-for-profit company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The functional and presentation currency of Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club Limited is Australian dollars. The financial report was authorised for issue by the Directors on 31 August, 2022. Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

Manly 16ft Skiff Sailing Club Limited applies Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010-2: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements and other applicable Australian Accounting Standards- Reduced Disclosure Requirements.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards- Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the Corporations Act 2001. The company is a not for profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received.

Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are measured using the cost model.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the assets useful life to the Company, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

Leasehold assets and improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired lease period or their estimated useful life.

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

Leases

Lease liabilities are measured at the present value of the payments to be made over the lease term at the commencement of the lease are discounted using the lessee's incremental borrowing rate. The incremental borrowing rate is the rate that the Club would have to pay to borrow funds necessary to obtain an asset of similar value to the right-of-use ('ROU') asset in a similar economic environment, with similar terms, security and conditions. Application of the incremental borrowing rate is adopted where the interest rate implicit in the lease cannot be readily determined from the contract, which is generally the case for leases in the Club.

Lease payments due within 12 months are recognised within current lease liabilities; payments due after 12 months are recognised within non-current liabilities. Interest on the lease liability in each period during the lease term shall be the amount that produces a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the lease liability. Interest expense on the lease liability is a component of finance cost and is presented in the statement of profit and loss

The short-term exemption will be applied to leases that are less than 12 months. These leases are recognised on a straight-line basis as an expense. Assets and liabilities arising from a lease are initially measured on a present value basis. Lease liabilities include the net present value of the following lease payments:

- fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments), less any lease incentives receivable;
- Variable lease payments that are based on an index or rate; and
- Payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the lessee exercising that option.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially using trade date accounting, i.e. on the date that company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise principally through the provision of goods and services to customers but also incorporate other types of contractual monetary assets.

After initial recognition these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Any change in their value is recognised in profit or loss.

The company's trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments.

In some circumstances, the company renegotiates repayment terms with customers which may lead to changes in the timing of the payments, the company does not necessarily consider the balance to be impaired, however assessment is made on a case-by-case basis.

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that do not qualify for inclusion in any of the other categories of financial assets or which have been designated in this category. The company's available-for-sale financial assets comprise listed securities.

Financial liabilities

The company's financial liabilities include borrowings, trade and other payables (including finance lease liabilities), which are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

At the end of each reporting period the company determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where this indicator exists the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss, except for goodwill.

Intangibles

Goodwill

Goodwill is carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses.

Goodwill - testing for impairment

Goodwill is tested annually for impairment and carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses.

Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits are presented as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the company does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date regardless of the classification of the liability for measurement purposes.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the company has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the outflow required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting year.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the company and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Interest revenue

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depends on whether the outcome of the services can be measured reliably. If this is the case then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period. If the outcome cannot be reliably measured then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the company is entitled to it.

Borrowing Costs

All borrowing costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset are capitalised as part of the cost of that asset.

All other borrowing costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

Comparative Amounts

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

Where a change in comparatives has also affected the opening retained earnings previously presented in a comparative period, an opening statement of financial position at the earliest date of the comparative period has been presented.

The Right-to-use asset and lease liability comparative has been restated for the 2021 financial year.

New Accounting Standards for Application in Future Periods

The AASB has issued a number of new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods, some of which are relevant to the company. The company has decided to adopt the new standards when they become mandatory.

Coronavirus (COVID-19)

Due to the re-development of St George and the effects of COVID-19, the Club has secured rent deferral and abatement agreements. The deferred rent has been accrued in the financial accounts. The rent abatement relief is from 1st April, 2020 to 30 September, 2020

Government assistance has been received and the effect on the 2022 accounts is \$324,358 (2021: \$541,400).

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The Directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the Club.

These estimated and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

Key judgements - AASB 16 Leases

The directors of the Club have made significant judgements regarding the recognition of leases and under AASB 16. Specifically these judgements relate to the incremental borrowing rate applied of 2% and the terms and conditions of the lease agreement held with NSW Maritime.

The lease agreement matures on 30 April 2042 at an annual rent of \$62,572 p.a.

Variable payments tied to the lease agreement with NSW Maritime have been excluded from the initial measurement of the lease liability and are recognised in the profit and loss in the period during the event or condition that triggers those payments occurs.

ST GEORGE CAPTAINS REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2022

As I write this report it certainly feels like a start of season report rather than the end of season report, but all for a very good reason indeed. The new clubhouse is finished and we are about to experience sailing at St George in a very different way. No doubt it has been a long time coming, however, it is important to remember that the club rebuild has been orchestrated by a handful of very dedicated volunteers doing this in their available time outside of work and family commitments. It is a truly enormous effort by the Board and pulling off a project of this size is something incredibly special. It makes me very excited for the future of our Club.

The past sailing season has been equally successful for sailors of St George as we maintained decent fleet numbers despite the challenges of not having a clubhouse and COVID-19. However, despite the challenges St George showed some solid form at both State and National events.
